Margaret, who preferred to be called Maggie, was born on October 8, 1930, and passed away on Wednesday, September 17, 2025, in Oklahoma City. She was the daughter of John J. Vater and Edith Marie Vater. Maggie graduated from Enid High School in 1948 and was a 1952 graduate of Oklahoma A. & M. (Oklahoma State University.)

Maggie worked at Vance Air Force Base and then relocated to Washington D.C. She worked for U.S. Senators Robert S. Kerr and J. Howard Edmondson. Later, she worked for the Air Force at the Pentagon and for the State Department in Germany and Austria. She was very interested in politics and loved to travel to countries in Europe.
